THE MORAL STATUTES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Section 1: Pertaining to the National Defense System post World War III

Section 1, Article 1: In response to the Third World War, the government of the United States of America will dissolve active military and para-military branches and support by all means necessary the creation of a Federal Bureau of Reformation.

Section 1, Article 2: The mission of the Federal Bureau of Reformation will be to resolve domestic threats or internal acts of terrorism and safeguard the borders against all foreign enemies or threats to national security.

Section 1, Article 3: The Federal Bureau of Reformation's activities will be overseen by the Chief of Reformation (*hereby identified as Chancellor*) in the Department of Reformation and approved of by the President of the United States (*See Addendum A for a flowchart of the chain of command*).

Section 1, Article 4: The Federal Bureau of Reformation shall be staffed by a draft of all eligible and mentally competent males (as deemed by the draft board), age sixteen and over. Selected persons will have three opportunities to present before the draft board at the intake site designated to them by letter. Should a draftee not present, the individual will be sentenced to a prison term mirroring a minimum of double the requested service time in the Federal Bureau of Reformation (or) will face disciplinary action deemed appropriate by a Commanding Officer in the Office of Recruitment.

Section 1, Article 5: Once the recruit has sworn an oath into the Federal Bureau of Reformation, his record status shall be changed from "civilian" to "Bureau Personnel" (*hereby identified as "soldier"*). The soldier is then subject to the required duties of his station as outlined in Assignment Training and in the Code of Reformative Justice printed below.

The Code of Reformative Justice:

Soldiers shall: (*see items a-h*)

- a) Receive compensation for services, paid either in cash or direct deposited into an account in the FBR Personnel Depository.
- b) Conduct themselves in the dignified and professional manner demanded by a position of such authority and dedicate themselves and their actions to the purpose of Reformation.
- c) Observe the FBR Code of Ethics, the Moral Standards and the Chain of Command.
- d) Not engage in extraneous relationships—romantic or otherwise—identified to interfere with the duties assigned to one's station.
- e) Remain active in the FBR until the tour of duty has been terminated in the form of an honorable or dishonorable discharge, approved by a Commanding Officer in the Office of Reformative Justice.
- f) Be subject to investigation of crimes against the Moral Standards.

- g) Be tried by a senior officer within the Federal Bureau of Reformation for neglecting duties, being found AWOL and/or failing to perform and will face a disciplinary action deemed appropriate to the crime by a Commanding Officer.
- h) Serve the President, the Chief of Reformation and the country with pride, honor, respect, and above all, loyalty to the Cause.

Section 2: Pertaining to the Moral Standards

Section 2, Article 1: The United States officially embraces the Church of America as her official religion. The attendance of regular services is strongly encouraged. Individuals observing alternative beliefs shall be held in contempt of the Moral Standards if they fail to comply with subsections a - c of Section 2, Article 1:

- a) Individuals choosing to observe alternative religions will not display propaganda, artifacts, relics or icons associated with their faith in conspicuous places.
- b) Individuals of alternative religions will not encourage, recruit or discuss their faith with others.
- c) Failure to comply with a or b shall result first in a warning, second in a fine and third in a disciplinary action deemed appropriate by a Commanding Officer in the Federal Bureau of Reformation.
 - a. (revised) Failure to comply with a or b shall result immediately in a disciplinary action deemed appropriate by a Commanding Officer in the Federal Bureau of Reformation.

Section 2, Article 2: Paraphernalia considered immoral is hereby banned and shall not be owned, bought/sold or traded for in any capacity.

- a) Immoral items include any form of media (audio, visual or tactile) in any medium (print, radio, televised, etc.) deemed inappropriate, including those items scandalous, violent, sexual or in opposition to the Moral Statutes as determined by the Church of America (*For a full list of items see Addendum B*).
- b) All items identified as immoral are to be disposed of in identified CONTRABAND ITEMS receptacles.
- c) Every citizen is subject to search and seizure of their home and personal property in order to assure compliance with Section 2, Article 2 of the Moral Statutes. Violators in possession of contraband are subject to trial by an investigative board of the Federal Bureau of Reformation and sentenced appropriately.

Section 2, Article 3: Whole families are to be considered one man, one woman and child(ren).

- a) Any alternative living arrangements (outside the parameters identified in Section 2, Article 3) are considered to be in violation of Conventional Morality, and are not eligible for tax, occupation, education or health benefits. Violators are subject to trial by an investigative board of the Federal Bureau of Reformation and sentenced appropriately.

Section 2, Article 4: Traditional male and female roles shall be observed.

- a) Men will work when able, serve in the Federal Bureau of Reformation if drafted and provide moral, ethical and religious support for their families.

- b) Women will respect their male partners, raise children, attend to domestic duties and encourage their family's faith and dedication to the Moral Standards.
- c) Both sexes will behave in a moral and respectful way when in each other's presence. This is included but not limited to:
 - a. wearing gender-specific clothing;
 - b. communicating in an appropriate, respectful manner;
 - c. maintaining acceptable distances from the opposite sex unless married;
 - d. separating and remaining apart during curfew hours unless married; and,
 - e. avoiding infidelity.

Section 2, **Article 5:** Children are considered valid citizens when conceived by a married man and wife. All other children are to be removed from the home and subjected to rehabilitative procedures.

- a) Unwed parents may be tried to determine legitimacy of children born out of wedlock. Evidence used in trial may include hospital records, birth certificates, identification cards and so forth.
 - a. (revised) Unwed parents may be tried to determine legitimacy of all children below the age of eighteen. Evidence used in trial may include hospital records, birth certificates, social security cards and so forth.
- b) Those parents held in contempt of Section 2, Article 5 by the investigative board shall be sentenced appropriately.
- c) Children's parental rights are absorbed by the state. Citizenship may be granted at the age of eighteen following completion of rehabilitation.

Section 2, Article 6: The following legal proceedings, medical procedures, and behaviors are considered immoral and hereby illegalized across the nation:

- a) Divorce;
- b) Emancipation of minors;
- c) Immigration;
- d) Abortion;
- e) Civilian possession of firearms;
- f) Subversive speech or assembly;
- g) Gambling; and,
- h) Prostitution.

Section 2, Article 7: Citizens knowingly or unknowingly assisting those in violation of the Moral Statutes are hereby denied trial and shall be punished to the full extent of the law.
